#### **General Rules**

Superintendents: Judy Brozik, Ellen Tusha,

- 4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) are eligible to exhibit at the lowa State Fair. Exception: Group exhibits from an entire dub may include 4th grade members.
- Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H'ers participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program.
- Exhibitors in 4-H classes are not eligible to exhibit in a similar department of the FFA divisions or vice-versa.

- Endangered and threatened plants and animals (includes insects), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibit.
- 6. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
- Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
- Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size.
- Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" height or width & 12" depth.
- 7. Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/ owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits.
- 10. All judges' decisions are final.
- 11. All exhibits must be properly labeled with exhibitor's name, age, dub and years enrolled in the project and are not to be removed before 4:30 p.m. on Sunday.
- 12. The Hancock County Ag Society (Fair Board) and Hancock County Extension & Outreach will use diligence to insure the safety of exhibits after their arrival and placement, but will not be responsible for damages or loss by fire, theft, etc.
- All premiums on individual entries will be paid to the members in the fair office after judging is completed.

## Flowers (Not eligible for State Fair)

- 1. Exhibits should be displayed in dear glass bottles furnished by the exhibitor.
- 2. Limit of 10 flower entries per exhibitor.
- Exhibits must be cared for by exhibitor during growing.
- Refer to 4H 464 "Preparing Cut Flowers and House Plants for Exhibit" for preparation instructions.
- 5. Variety must be listed on tag.

- 1. Exhibits should be displayed on a plain white paper plate, furnished by the exhibitor.
- 2. Limit of 10 vegetable entries per exhibitor.
- 3. Exhibits must be cared for by exhibitor during growing.
- Refer to 4-H 462 "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit" for preparation instructions.
- 5. Variety must be listed on tag.
- Uniformity must be considered when 2 or more specimens are required.
- Cleanliness is important but read preparation instructions about washing versus brushing off dirt. It is different for different vegetables.

# **Display Arrangements**

#### Class

- A. Small Flower Arrangement with cut flowers grown by exhibitor
- B. Small Flower Arrangement, may include

purchased flowers.

#### Class

- C. Collection of Herbs in jars or bottles with water, displayed together in one box or tray. Include 5 different types; label each as to name and possible uses. (Use fresh herbs).
- D. Best Garden Display - Limited to FIRST YEAR garden members only (all ages eligible). To consist of at least 5 to 7 (not more than 7) different kinds of vegetables, (not varieties) attractively arranged by exhibitor in suitable container of exhibitor's choice. Each display should occupy no more than four (4) square feet of table space (about 2' by 2'). If any materials other than vegetables are used such as flowers, artificial greens or similar decorations, these should be only a supplemental part of the display. This class will be judged on artistic appeal, color preparation and balance, distinction, originality and quality.
- E. Best Garden Display Second and third year Junior Gardeners (exhibitors 4th-6th grade). Description same as D.
- F. Best Garden Display Second year and above Intermediate and Senior Gardeners (exhibitor 7th-12th grade). Same as Class D but consists of at least 8-10 (not more than 10) different kinds of
- vegetables (not varieties) in display.
